



The purpose of The Civic Club of Harrisburg (TCCH and TCCH Affiliates) is to promote and engage in civic and social activities which preserve the heritage of the Club and its landmark building; encourage cultural and historic interest in the community; contribute to improving the welfare and education of children and youth, seniors and those in need; and foster relationships with like-minded organizations.



TCCH Holiday Service Project: Salvation Army

This year TCCH will support The Salvation Army Harrisburg as our Holiday Service Project. Please bring the items you would like to contribute to the Holiday Brunch on December 4. There will be decorated containers: one for Hygiene Items, one for Food, one

for Snacks and a box for Gift Cards.

The Salvation Army Harrisburg assists over 20,000 people in Dauphin, Eastern Cumberland and Perry Counties. They have programs for more than 2500 at-risk children and youth. They assist many individuals who are homeless and/or families who lack adequate cooking facilities. Where canned goods are listed, "pop top" cans are preferred (i.e. - nothing that requires a can opener.)

Items needed: HYGIENE ITEMS - tooth brushes, tooth paste, shampoo, soaps and body wash, hand sanitizer, deodorant, feminine hygiene products, disposable razors and shaving cream; FOOD ITEMS - "Ready to Eat" meals such as canned ravioli, Beefaroni, chili, stews, beans, etc., canned meat, tuna, chicken, canned fruits and vegetables, peanut butter/ jelly or honey (plastic jars only, and disposable table utensils; SNACK FOODS - granola bars, trail mix, canned nuts, crackers of any type, goldfish etc. and GROCERY STORE GIFT CARDS.



Let's go into the heart of the Pennsylvania Dutch countryside to Lititz, Pa which was voted the 2013 'coolest small town in America!' Perhaps you might remember those rolling hills of autumn ripened grain in the Harrison Ford movie *Witness*? From its origins, the picturesque landscape and promising pastureland has beckoned the traveler. Eighteenth century Moravians escaping religious persecution founded Lititz in 1756 naming it after Litice Castle in Bohemia, now the Czech Republic. Progressive thinkers for their time, the Moravians established *Linden Hall* for the education of girls. Today Linden Hall is the oldest boarding school in America.

Walking along Main Street, you will find brick homes side -by -side with one-of-a-kind businesses. Quaint boutiques, antique shops, and delicious cafés boost the local experience and promise something for everyone. Additional stops include but are not limited to these possibilities:

- 1. 1792 John Mueller House: costumed docents give a glimpse of life in a Moravian settlement
- **2. Julius Sturgis Pretzel Factory:** America's first commercial pretzel bakery; hear the story of how a mis take became the hard pretzel snack we enjoy today. Be sure to take little ones to roll their own pretzels!
- 3. Lititz Historical Foundation
- 4. Moravian Church Square
- 5. Erbs Covered Bridge
- **6. Linden Hall's** beautiful grounds
- **7. Wilbur Chocolate Americana Factory Store**: creator of 'Wilbur Buds' since 1893..predating Hershey's Kisses
- **8. Historic General Sutter's Inn and Restaurant**....delicious, I might add and the patio is perfect on warm Autumn days
- 9. Lititz Springs Park: once a summer retreat for the medicinal properties of the springs

HOUSEWARMING IN NEW-CLUBHOUSE

Harrisburg Civic Club Throws Open Its Beautiful Homeon Thanksgiving

To work, to wait and finally to win. Such has been the history of the Harrisburg Civic Club. Yesterday, most appropriate date for so important an casion, the doors of the new clubhouse were thrown open to all mem-bers and their friends. Up and down the stairs went the eager feet of the omen who had not served upon any of the necessary committees and so were anxious to catch first glimpse of the beauties awaiting them. Before long it was almost possible to tell at a glance who were the visitors and who the regular members because of the sense of delighted ownership displayed by the latter. And much cause, indeed, have the women of the Civic Club to be proud, first of the wonderful gift bequeathed to them and then for th eexquisite taste displayed in the furnishings.

The whole lower oor has been left practically unchanged to preserve the home atmosphere. On the second floor the entire south side of the building has been thrown into a large assembly hall, done in gray and white with delft blue curtains at the many windows overlooking a view hard to equal in any city. The waxed floor fairly calls an invitation to the younger dancing contingent to come and let it be enjoyed. The plane has its own alcove with ample room for an orchestra. There is an immaculate kitchenetic connecting by dumb waiter with the main kitchen below, as well as dressing rooms for checking wraps and applying the final touch of powder. All can be leased together for the evening with the cotiness and completeness of a private house.

The top floor is given over entirely to rooms, both single and double, for renting purposes. Woven rag rugs and simple dainty furnishings make them most attractive domiciles for women without regular homes or transients in the city. There are six renting rooms in all.

There is much yet to be done in the little touches which give character and personality and the "woman touch" so essential to a homing place of women of culture. This will come with time. The wonder is that so much has been accomplished in a few months. It means unflusging real and untiring energy on the part of the women into whose bands the work was entrusted.

Tea was served during the afternoon in the dining room on the Front street side of the first floor. Mrs. Henry McCormick pressdien, assisted by Mrs. John Relly and Miss Shunk. Here, there and everywhere were the club's efficers. The president, Mrs. William Henderson, received in the main hall-way and gave the right kind of werd and handclasp. dancing contingent to come and let it be enjoyed. 
